

The UWRWA Regional MS4 Public Education & Involvement Program

In 2009 the UWRWA launched its regional education efforts through the coordination of area MS4s. Any MS4 in the Upper White River Watershed is eligible and welcome to participate in the program. The objective of the program is to pool financial resources and then work collaboratively through the UWRWA to implement an education and involvement program. This coordinated approach allows for unified messaging and buying power. The yearly program deliverables are dependent upon the number of participating MS4s (total budget), as well as the objectives and desires of the committee of participating MS4s. A population based fee structure was developed (shown below). Fees represent part of the program's budget. Other monies are leveraged via grants sought and held by the UWRWA (a non-profit organization). A greater number of participating MS4s would allow us to increase our effectiveness and gain more recognition for our programs and efforts. Please consider joining us!
